Pursuing racial and economic equity.

Preparing peers for an anti-Black world.

Improving themselves to improve their community.

The Why and How of Young Black Changemaking

Black youth have different pathways into changemaking. Three key launching points describe what sparks Black youth to start their changemaking journey. **Youth-Driven Encounters with Influential People** Journey Get youth involved early **Racism** Driven by passion for a cause Ask or recruit youth Interpersonal and institutional Driven by desire for life Inspire youth racism sparked changemaking change

Launching Points: What Sparks Young Black Changemaking?

Black families are a core influence on young Black changemakers, and this influence played out in three major ways.

Family members act as essential connectors to and supporters of civic engagement for Black youth.

Black youth use civic engagement to support, protect, and honor family.

Family as Essential Connectors and Supporters of Young Black Changemaking

Black youth's experiences in community organizations are central to their growth as changemakers. Four experiences stand out: Opportunities to see tangible results from Seeing Impact changemaking and engage in meaningful Opportunities to express Feeling Heard one's views and have adults truly listen. Growing into Opportunities to plan, create, and lead. Leaders Opportunities to be supported, feel safe, and Being in build community with Community others, especially other Black people.

The Role of Organizations in Sustaining Young Black Changemaking

Black youth develop individual and collective identity through changemaking.

- ☐ Building knowledge of historical injustices and legacies of Black changemakers strengthens youth's identity as a Black person and Black community member.
- ☐ Changemaking is one way that Black youth resist stereotypes.
- ☐ Racial awareness and identity can shift broad civic engagement to racial justice changemaking.
